### Today's Program...

#### **Sheriff Jerry Clayton on the Opioid Crisis**



**Dan Burroughs**

Our program today was introduced by **Dan Burroughs**. Sheriff Jerry Clayton has served as Washtenaw County Sheriff since January 1, 2009 having previously held many other roles including: Operations Lieutenant, County Court Security Commander, SWAT Team Commander, Corrections Division Commander, and Police Services Division Commander. He stepped away from the public sector for a time serving as Vice President of Lamberth Consulting, LLC. Fortunately for everyone in Washtenaw County, he was encouraged to come back to the public sector in 2008.

Sheriff Jerry Clayton shared with us that the only reason he ran for the position of Sheriff was to serve. He does not believe in calling his office a Law Enforcement Agency but more refers to it as a Human Services Organization made to serve the people of Washtenaw County and beyond. In regards to the opioid crisis which our country is facing, he has very progressive views. He believes we have waged a war on our people instead of a war on the drug crisis and that what we have done for the last 30-40 years to curb the drug problem has been ineffective. He believes that we should certainly criminalize the individuals who are selling the drugs, making the drugs, etc. But he does not want to criminalize the addiction people are facing. He believes we have to partner with other people to find solutions to these problems our country is facing.

The Sheriff's office's mission statement includes these objectives: 1. Create public safety (this is a never-ending challenge for their office and they are always finding solutions through partnerships with other agencies and strategies are also dependent on location—it's not a cookie-cutter solution for all of Washtenaw County). 2. Provide quality service (commitment to providing quality human services to all the people of Washtenaw County). 3. Build strong and sustainable communities (Sheriff Clayton never wants the sheriff's office to be viewed as a necessary evil of the community but more an integral part of the fabric of the community).

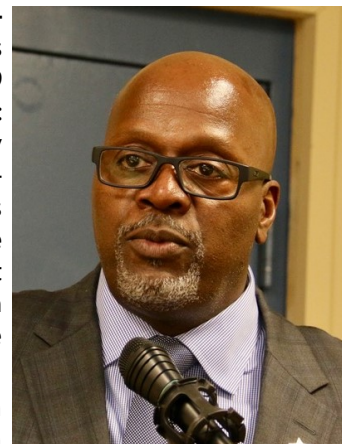

**Today's Program Continued from Page 1...**

Sheriff Clayton then went on to talk about the opioid crisis and how the incidence of overdose has increased over 400% within the last two years. There have been triple digit increases of people entering the emergency room because of overdose. He made the decision to equip all the staff with Naloxone (an antagonist to opioids) in 2015 and to date they have saved over 50 people. But he knows this isn't the ultimate solution as people are dealing with underlying issues including suicidal ideation, mental health issues, addiction, etc. The Washtenaw County Sheriff's office responds to at least two known calls per day of people dealing with mental health issues (and those are just the calls where that information is specifically known but many more are responded to where mental health is also an issue). He has teamed up with Trish Cortes, Executive Director of Washtenaw Community Mental Health to create a partnership so that addiction to opioids and mental health issues can be addressed at their root cause. The officers will be going through CIT (Crisis Intervention Training) in order to create a mental health SWAT team for the sheriff's department. He wants the officers to not only be able to handle issues dealing with law enforcement, but also be equipped to help with underlying issues dealing with addiction and mental health.

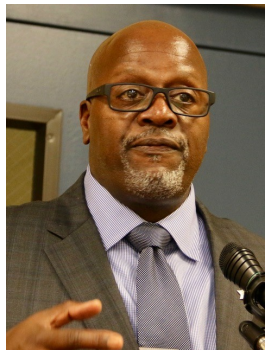
Sheriff Clayton then handed the floor over to Trish to tell us more about what she does and how her agency is teaming up with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Office. Her department, Washtenaw Community Mental Health, is experiencing challenges as they face the fight against opioid addiction as well as mental health issues all while having wider-reaching state funding decreased by over 60%. They primarily serve low-income individuals through the Medicaid system. However, opioid addiction and mental health issues are not contained to just that population and people outside of this group are not receiving help. Youth suicide has increased by 433% in the last four years. There were nine suicides alone in the Ann Arbor Public School systems last year and not a single one of those children were on the radar of the Washtenaw Community Mental Health program. The Washtenaw County Sheriff's Office and Washtenaw Community Mental Health are teaming up to break the stigma around mental health and opioid issues and are creating programs for schools so that children who aren't eligible for services through the Community Mental Health program are being reached. They are working with our health systems to develop better crisis intervention programs to catch people before they land in the emergency room or in jail.

A few questions were taken at the end. **Garry Donner** wanted to know the impact of the internet on social isolation and extreme thinking. Trish responded that she believes the internet has had an impact on these issues and especially social media on youth. People think they have friends but are very socially isolated and also are facing these issues before their frontal lobe of their brain is fully developed which helps with decision making. She is working on a project with local primary care physicians where they are asking deeper questions to people to determine if they are suffering from mental health issues and getting them help.

**Dan Dever** wanted to know if unemployment is having an impact on the increase in mental health issues and opioid use. Sheriff Clayton noted that we are actually in a low time with unemployment but that we must consider all factors and this could be one. Issues related to

employment such as underemployment, minimum wage gaps, education, etc. could all be adding to underlying issues people are facing which cause them to commit crimes. He said we are all in the position to help people in that we have the power to engage one another and create personal connections in a society where we frequently have our faces buried in our phones. He also encouraged us to dispose of any unwanted medications. Bring it to the sheriff's office for them to properly dispose of.

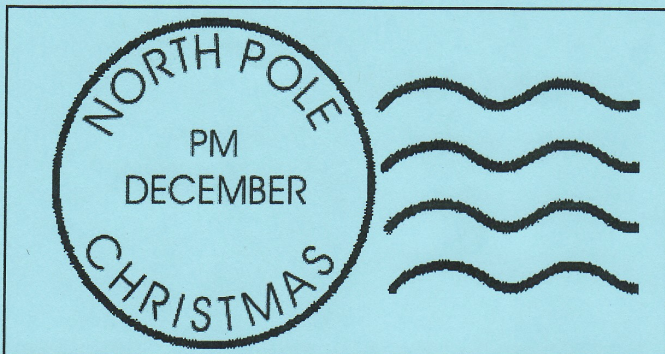

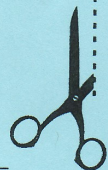
